



## Paul L Roeder

April 27, 1928 - April 10, 2011

Paul was born in Hannibal, Wisconsin on April 27, 1928. He grew up as the oldest of 14 children in Spooner Wisconsin. He milked cows, walked to school, played hooky to go

fishing, and loved to play baseball. At the age of 16 he went to work on ships in the Great Lakes and when he was barely old enough, he enlisted in the US Army where he served in Europe as a truck driver and expert rifleman. He returned to complete diesel engineering school. With the outbreak of the Korean War he was called back to active duty. His certification as a diesel mechanic kept him behind the front lines and he returned with an honorable discharge on the 15th of March 1951. He worked as a brick and stone mason during the years he was raising his first family and went back into engineering at Indiana University. He loved to fish. As he transitioned from Indiana to Oregon with his 2nd family towing a boat filled with all their earthly possessions in 1972, he tried his hand at commercial fishing. It was the worst year on record for commercial fishing in the Great Northwest but Clackamas Community College was waiting in the wings and Paul worked there for 17.5 years as Chief Engineer and Baseball Coach. He enjoyed his work, was a friend to everyone on campus and devoted many thousands of hours to coaching. He worked tirelessly to improve youth and college baseball fields, facilities and programs as he led and inspired young men from age 7 years and upward. Summers were baseball seasons and vacations were fishing trips. Upon his retirement he gave his life to Jesus Christ and was made a "fisher of men". He devoted the remainder of his years on earth to studying the scriptures and imparting the Word of the Lord to as many as he could and traveled many miles every Spring and Fall to reach souls he coveted for the Kingdom of God.

Paul L. "Coach" Roeder passed away peacefully at home on Sunday, April 10th at the age of 82 years and 11 months. Predeceased by his parents Cyril Roeder and Elsie Ferry and four younger siblings, Wayne, Jan, Joy and Cyril he is survived by his loving wife, Bonnie Carol Roeder, their three sons Brad, Scott and Bryan and his step-son Ray Ford, sons Craig Roeder, Fred Roeder and daughter, Paula Mood; 17 grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great-grandson; 3 brothers, John, Dale and Alan; 6 sisters, Joan Anderson, Jean Beaver, Marge Miano, Eileen Henderson, Francis Davison and Karen Buser; and many nieces and nephews remembering him with great fondness.

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“ When I was in the fifth grade I started playing the trumpet. My dad told me that he used to play a musical instrument when he was a kid. I had never really felt that connected to the old man and the thought that we shared something in common sparked my interest. This could be one of those great father-son moments. So, I asked, “What instrument did you play?” He said, “The Swinette.” He paused and let me think about that for a little bit. I had never heard of that instrument. I had a puzzled look on my face and dad said, “You don’t know what a Swinette is?” like I should know. I shook my head and said, “No.” Then he said, “Why, that’s a piece of cat gut stretched across a pig’s ass and you pick it with your teeth.” That wasn’t the father-son moment I was looking for but, it made me laugh. There were many of those moments in my life.

I continued to play the trumpet and other instruments. By the time I was in junior high I had planned on becoming a music teacher. My dad wasn’t very supportive of my musical endeavors. One time he suggested that I go practice my trumpet in the bath tub under water. I realize now that he was giving me practical advice. Not practicing under water but, that it was unlikely that music would lead to a career that could support a family.

I can only remember one time that he showed up to one of my musical performances. He was late and wearing a baseball uniform. I was still very happy to see him. I was playing the part of the Pirate King in my high school spring musical presentation of Pirates of Pen’zance. Now that I am the father of a son, I understand how that may have been difficult for my dad to watch. There I was up on stage, dressed up like a pirate, wearing makeup, singing, and dancing. I can only imagine what my dad was thinking. In retrospect my dad showed great restraint withholding remarks that may have been hurtful at that time.

Some of my fondest childhood memories were from the annual fishing trips that dad took us on. We would leave home around 3 am to avoid traffic. After setting up camp we would get in some fishing before bedtime. We woke up before the crack of dawn to get on the lake by sunrise. Brad and I were sitting on the same seat in the boat. We were trolling for trout. We had these surf rods that had 3 foot handles. It was easy to shake the handle and make the other brother think he was getting a bite. When we were having too much fun, dad was quick to remind us that this was a fishing trip not a vacation. He would tell us to quit fooling around and catch some fish. We caught a lot of fish.

It wasn’t until adulthood that I felt connected to my dad. I had become a hard working blue collar worker and, like him, I did my own auto work. I helped him work on his vehicles and, when it became too difficult for him, I was his mechanic. I had finally won the approval of my father. I think I had more in common with the old man than any of my brothers. I may have had more in common with him than I would have liked to. In the end, I think I was his favorite son.
